Maximizing Impact on Families

Looking for ways to maximize the impact of Raising Readers books on your patients? Use the language below to reinforce important reading messages and to help parents understand how reading aloud helps support their child's healthy development.

New 9-month title: **Head, Shoulders, Knees & Toes**



Advice for Parents

Books that can be sung aloud are some of the best tools to teach young toddlers that books can be fun and active. Dancing to a tune sung aloud from a book, young toddlers will enjoy hearing the story again and again. And that's a good thing because eventually your child will sing the story to you! Memorizing and reciting short stories as a preschooler is an important pre-reading skill that can be nurtured early on in young toddlers by reading (and singing) repetitive, rhythmic stories such as **Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes**.

New 2-year title: **Cows in the Kitchen**



Advice for Parents

By offering reading opportunities throughout the day, children can visit the same books or activities again and again, thereby becoming comfortable with text and understanding some of its characteristics. Encourage children to mimic your retelling of a story and to use a variety of sounds or voices for the storybook characters. Everyone will have fun and early literacy skills will be built. Check out the activities page printed in the back of the book for ideas on making reading aloud fun for the entire family.
